**Subject:** HR11 – Program Staffing Patterns

**Reference:** 1306.20 (a-e), 1304.52 (g)(1-5)

**Policy:** Program services will have appropriate linguistic support, and will be

appropriately staffed and supervised.

## Procedure:

Child Development Supervisor will supervise classroom staff and will ensure the following guidelines are met:

- 1. When the majority of children in a program setting speak the same language, at least one staff member that interacts with the children must speak that language; classroom staff and home visitors must be able to communicate with the families they serve either directly or through a translator, and should be familiar with the ethnic background of these families.
- 2. Adequate supervision will be maintained for all children in and out of the classroom and in all play areas.
- 3. For center-based options, staffing levels mandated in the Performance Standards will be provided; substitutes will be utilized as necessary to keep these levels at or above the minimum level.
  - a. There will be no more than 4 infant/toddlers per teacher, and no more than 8 in any one group.
  - b. Each classroom setting must employ two people per classroom, at least one of who is a teacher. The additional staff member may be a teacher or teacher's aide. When possible, a third person may be utilized in the classroom as a volunteer.
  - c. Classrooms serving predominantly four or five year old children will average 17 to 20 children. No more than 20 children will be enrolled in one class.
  - d. Classrooms serving predominantly 3 year old children will average 15-17 children. No more than 17 children will be enrolled in one class.
  - e. The teacher should make every effort to make two home visits per child/year. For Migrant Head Start programs, teachers are required to plan at least two parent-teacher conferences per child/year. These visits and conferences take place outside of the normally scheduled class time.
- 4. For home-based options, home visitors must be employees and they will be responsible for both the home visits and group socialization activities.
- 5. For both home- and center-based program options, staff must be given enough work time to accomplish necessary program activities that fall outside of the classroom or home environment. These other activities may include: pre-service training; planning, setting up and closing the program; conducting health exams, screenings, or immunization activities; maintaining records; and other activities required to keep service plans updated and relevant.
