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Week Two	Time to get outside and take a nature walk around your house or neighborhood: Take a basket and collect different nature objects. Alphabet books: make a book about the alphabet; construction paper, paper, markers, alphabet cards. Have your child work on a single alphabet for each page of the book. Make binoculars by taping two rolls of toilet paper together. Provide an opportunity for your child to share binoculars while searching for a butterfly.	Give your child a collection of cotton balls and a piece of construction paper. Explain that they are going to count Mary's Lambs in a pretend country game.	Sing a song. Teach your child a new song. Sing the song together and then clap your hands to the rhythm and let your child sing and clap the song.	Print your child's name in large letters. Point to and name each letter in his or her name. Post their name on the wall and have your child identify.	While shopping and doing errands together, point at particular places and ask your child to tell you what they are. Ex: post office, school, market, Library, etc.	Use a small sandwich bag, fill with different dried fruit by colors. Count the fruit and sort. Use a clothespin in the middle of the bag and use googly eyes and pipe cleaners to finish.
